Dear Friends,

The last few months have been filled with many opportunities to respond to our community's needs and here are a few highlights:

- We celebrated with a GED graduate after they passed their 4th and final test;
- Offered our blessings to an interim housing family who dedicated their new home in partnership with Habitat for Humanity;
- Provided access for a shower and laundry services to an individual experiencing homelessness at Place of Hope; and
- Saw the impact that providing on-site mental health counseling has in the life of a participant who was able to return to work after struggling with the effects of PTSD.

We were thrilled to host two "Maid for Conversation" panel discussions with community partners which focused on homelessness and the benefits cliff in February and March. These culminated at our 7th annual Uniting for Change luncheon in April where we elevated the conversation on humanity, compassion and justice. Thank you for the countless ways you come alongside us and support United Ministries' ongoing mission in Greenville. On April 12th, we welcomed Stephanie Land, author of *Maid: Hard Work, Low Pay and a Mother's Will to Survive,* as our keynote speaker for the 2023 Uniting for Change Luncheon. An audience of 1,200 listened as she shared her experience as a single, homeless mother, and called us to "look marginalized people in our community in the eye and listen to their stories of struggle, heartache, and impossibility."

We were also fortunate to hear a UM participant's story of courage, determination and strength. In her words, "having people treat you with dignity and respect while believing in you means so much when you're in such a vulnerable state and situation like homelessness...".

#### Volunteer Appreciation Luncheon

On Wednesday, May 3, our volunteers gathered with staff to celebrate another wonderful year of volunteerism at United Ministries. The catered luncheon was provided by Tony Pepper and held at Fourth Presbyterian Church. Speakers included volunteer Minnie Thomas and Volunteer Manager Susan Midgett, who shared their stories of why they became involved in volunteering and non-profit work. Collectively, our volunteers worked a total of 9,778 hours in 2022, which is the monetary equivalent of \$292,851, according to research conducted by the Independent Sector organization. Volunteers serve in all areas of United Ministries, and we could not fulfill our mission without their dedication and passion!

#### **Program Updates**

A UM participant recently shared: "*I am truly blessed to have United Ministries for support. [They have] offered several areas of assistance for me and my family.*" We're excited to share the impact of your donations with these highlights from January-March 2023:

- Our **Housing** program served 23 families including 33 adults and 52 children
- Three of those families moved from emergency shelter into interim housing
- Four families moved into permanent housing



- 267 individuals participated in financial coaching sessions in **Striving to Thrive**
- 11 participants obtained jobs
- Mental Health Counseling conducted 96 sessions
- 577 families received \$29,293 worth of food from Emergency Assistance
- 425 families received assistance with utilities or rent, totaling over \$58,160
- 11 participants received essential medications



- Adult Education served 157 students from January-March
- 650 academic sessions were conducted
- 46 Subject Tests were passed, with 5 students passing the GED test
- 2,190 visits were made to our **Place of Hope** day shelter, including 72 first-time visitors
- Case management services were provided to 92 individuals, such as obtaining IDs, securing treatment, and finding shelter

In honor of Black History Month in February, two of our community partners, **Michelin** and **TD Bank**, joined forces to hold a Charity Sneaker Ball fundraiser to benefit United Ministries. In addition to raising funds through ticket sales for the dance, both Michelin and TD Bank made financial gifts to support our mission. We are so grateful to these businesses who join us in our vision of a community working together to ensure that everyone has the opportunity to thrive in Greenville!
